### **Punnetts Town Community Primary School**



Punnetts Town is a Community Primary School; it opened in May 1879.

The school is at the western end of the village, 3 miles south east of Heathfield. Pupils attending the school live in Punnetts Town, Rushlake Green, Heathfield and the surrounding villages.

In 2006, a new extension was added to the Victorian School Building providing three new classrooms, cloakrooms and a new entrance/reception area for the school. There are a range of outdoor spaces for the children to play, including the Millennium garden, an activity area and a quiet area.

In 2020 the entrance was updated with a new roof and transformed into the school Library immersing everyone into books as they enter the school.

The School is a partner in the Heathfield Area Schools Partnership which includes the local Primary schools and Heathfield Community College.



#### **Woodlands Federation**

Geographically close, rural, primary Schools working together to improve the learning opportunities for all of the pupils. The school character is maintained within their village settings.

Punnetts Town Community Primary School and Dallington Church of England Primary School work in partnership as Woodlands Federation. Both Schools have an acting Headteacher and Share the Governing Body.

## Admission to Reception Class at Punnetts Town School



Our Reception pupils come from a range of nurseries and pre-school groups, including Little Punnetts Pre-School which is located within the main body of the school.





All children who are due to start in Reception will have the opportunity to visit and experience play sessions at our school before their first day.

To help children feel part of our school family, a planned transition programme takes place for every child to ensure that the very important change to primary school life happens as smoothly as possible, both for child and parents!





Our Reception class teacher will visit the children in their pre-school setting and opportunities to meet with parents are planned so that we have all the information that we need to support your child in the best way that we can.

## Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

Our Foundation Stage pupils are located within Beech classroom. It is a distinct stage and one in which play is vital, with child-initiated activity combining with teacher-led sessions.





Learning takes place through first hand experiences, focussing on the children's interests. Planned and purposeful activities provide opportunities for teaching and learning both indoors and outdoors. There is a designated outdoor play area for the Reception pupils.

## The curriculum is split into three prime areas and four specific areas:

#### Prime Areas:

- ♦ Communication and Language
- Physical Development
- Personal, social and emotional development

#### Specific Areas:

- ♦ Literacy
- ♦ Mathematics
- Understanding of the World
- Expressive Arts and Design


There is time for free choice play and structured play throughout Key Stage 1. This continues to allow children the opportunity to express themselves, develop new skills and build up their relationships with other children. It also gives them the opportunity to use their imagination and take the role of different characters.

Topic work becomes an increasing part of curriculum time as the children expand their knowledge and skills. This forms an essential part of the children's learning about the wider world around them.



Artwork also plays a valuable role in topics and in its own right. Information regarding topics is given to parents three times a year and is shared on the class website page. The children are also encouraged to explore sound, rhythm and melody in music, using both tuned and un-tuned instruments. In P.E. the children continue to develop their gymnastic, dance and games skills.

Science and technology form an important base for the majority of topics, whilst other topics are based on geographical, historical and religious themes.





#### **Key Stage Two**



#### **The Primary Years**

Throughout Key Stage 2 the threads of the curriculum from Key Stage 1 continue.

Cross curricular topic work allows the children to develop a greater understanding of the world, geographical and historical topics are covered more deeply. They are also encouraged to develop independent and co-operative ways of working.

The children have greater opportunities to use different mediums in art and to develop their musical skills. They also take part in music performances and festivals such as the Big Dance Extravaganza in Tunbridge Wells.

We build on what the children as learners already know and have a culture of high expectation.





Understanding is developed through enquiry, creativity and group problem solving. Children are taught skills for life.

The children gain a greater understanding of playing team sports and take part in a variety of games within school and against other local schools. We offer children the opportunity to take part in a number of sporting activities such as swimming, tag rugby, gymnastics, football, tennis, hockey, netball and multi-skills.

The children help to plan and perform a Harvest Festival, a Leavers' Service at the end of the year and also take part in Christmas carol singing and a KS2 Summer Production.

We take a keen interest in children playing musical instruments and have offered peripatetic music lessons for a range of instruments including the guitar, drums and flute.

#### **Educating Minds, Bodies and Souls**



#### **Sporting Aims and Provision**

All children are encouraged to take part in sporting activities. Our aim is to promote enjoyment, healthy exercise, sportsmanship, co-operation and teamwork. Being a smaller school, children have a greater opportunity to take part.

"We ran with all the other schools I was at the back, but managed to get to the front until I started running up the hill! I found the hills quite tricky and there were also lots of holes on the ground. I still came in the first third of the runners"

"I'm glad I was part of the team for the hockey tournament. I played attack and goalie. I knew not to worry if I lost the ball—just keep going! Hockey is now favourite sport!"

We encourage participation to the best of each child's ability.

Excellence in all sport is celebrated at every opportunity in school and in both local and national competitions.

"It was really good to be there as I'd never been to a tournament before.

I love football and would like to go again next year."

The school has a large, level playground enabling us to deliver high quality P.E.

We aim to widen children's sporting achievements by taking part in a variety of tournaments, festivals and individual games with other schools. These may be competitive, against other teams, or purely for enjoyment.

We compete in inter-school cross-country running, football, tag-rugby, netball, and swimming. We are working with Heathfield

Community College and other local primary schools to develop sporting links between schools.

We were awarded the Sainsbury's School Games Sports' Mark Award for our continued participation and activity within and beyond the school day.

Children are taught to support and encourage one another - both in victory and defeat.

As part of the P.E. Curriculum, different games and skills are taught throughout the year. We compete in a variety of sports including cross-country running, dance, football, netball, tag-rugby, stool ball and swimming.



#### **Extra Curricular Activities**



We value the importance of offering children a wide range of educational and sporting activities out of school hours.

We believe that our children benefit from these additional activities, gaining valuable skills and discovering new strengths that will give them a solid foundation for their future ahead.

Music lessons are offered by East Sussex Music and Red Butler Music School. Pupils are taught by peripatetic teachers at school.

In addition to the educational visits made in connection with cross-curricular topics, groups of Year 5/6 pupils take part in residential visits and we have held a very successful joint year 4 federation residential which we plan to repeat every year.





#### **Assessments**

In line with statutory requirements, our year 6 pupils have National Curriculum tests and assessments. These are currently in maths, writing, reading and in spelling, punctuation and grammar.

Assessments are also made at the end of the Foundation Stage, Year 1 Phonics screening, end of key stage 1 assessments and Year 4 Multiplication skills test.

Teachers regularly review children's progress throughout their schooling.
The results of all these assessments are communicated to parents / carers through the Annual Summary Report and parent consultations across the academic year,

#### **Communication with Parents**

As a small village school, we pride ourselves on knowing each individual family that forms our school community and working together in partnership is crucial to the well being of the children in our care.

#### Parent/Teacher Consultations

Parent Teacher Consultations to discuss pupil progress and welfare are held in the Autumn Term and in the Spring Terms.

Towards the end of the Summer Term the Annual Summary Report is sent home giving a written account of progress during the school year, results of assessments and targets for future development.

#### Communication

Opportunities for shared learning are held throughout the year These are opportunities for teachers and children to share with parents their work and achievements.

A 'topic review' is sent home to share the term's curriculum to empower families to support and engage in learning at home.

Curriculum evenings and workshops are held to keep parents informed about developments and approaches being utilised in our teaching, and to explain new initiatives.

Communications including fortnightly newsletters are sent out via Studybugs with the aim of keeping parents and carers informed about school life. activities.

#### Volunteers

At Punnetts Town Community Primary School we place great emphasis on an active partnership between home and school.

We have working groups for parents that help on a regular basis or for special projects, visits or sporting activities. An extra pair of hands is always useful in a busy primary school. Staff and children welcome this help; it strengthens the bond between home and school and it assists in the quality of education we are able to offer. Parents find it can also help them learn new skills and it is fun!

Sometimes, for local visits or sporting events, members of staff or volunteer parents transport pupils by private car, these are all kept on a register, updated annually. The school has a code of conduct for all volunteer drivers.

Covid restricts this at the moment.

The school has a successful parent forum creating a link between the school and parent body. There are three meetings throughout the year.

Friends of Punnetts Town has proved a superb link for parental engagement and vital fundraising. Recent fundraising has provided new library furniture and hard standing areas for the new EYFS outdoor classroom and storage shed.

#### **More About Us**



#### **School Meals**

School meals are prepared and cooked in the School Kitchen. The menu is planned with healthy eating in mind; a vegetarian option is also provided. If a different diet is required for a medical reason parents can consult the School Cook or Chartwells and inform the school office. Bookings for meals are made on line via Parent Pay. This flexibility enables families to opt for the meal choice that suits them best. All pupils in Years Reception, 1 and 2 are entitled to Universal Infant free school meals and we encourage you all to use this facility.



#### **Morning Snacks and Drinks**

Children up to the age of 7 years (Years R to 2) are provided every day with a mid-morning snack, fruit or vegetable through the NHS 5-a-day project. Older pupils are encouraged to bring a healthy snack to school. Children up to the age of 5 years are provided with free milk. Children over 5 years may purchase milk, at a subsidised price, for their mid-morning break. All children must bring a bottle of water to school everyday.
